HEAT STROKE

Know The Symptoms



Brain
-Seizures

Eyes
-Glassy eyes
-Fearful Expression

Mouth
-Heavy panting
-Excessive drooling & thick saliva
-Red or purple tongue and gums, which turn grey as shock sets in
-Vomiting
-Difficulty breathing
-Excessive thirst

Legs
-Collapsing or staggering
-Unsteadiness

Heart
-Racing heart

Body
-High Body Temperature
-Normal 100.5° to 102.5°
-Heat Exhaustion 104°
-Heat Stroke 107° to 109°
-Lethargy

By the time signs of heat stroke are visible, it's often too late!
Dogs can die of heat stroke within 15 MINUTES

DO move your pet to a shaded/cool environment. If possible, take their temperature.

DO cool the body by wetting it down and placing a fan or other cool breeze.

DO call the nearest emergency vet and inform them that you are on your way and the situation.

DON'T use ice or icy water to cool down their body temperature.

DON'T over cool your pet's body.

DON'T force water down your pet's mouth, but do have fresh water available for them.

DON'T leave your pet unattended.

NEVER LEAVE A DOG IN A HOT CAR
Temperatures inside a car within 10 mins
78° day up to 120°
90° day up to 160°

DID YOU KNOW:
In 2016, City of Phoenix made it a Class 1 misdemeanor, and punishable with a fine up to \$2,500 and six months in jail, to be on its hiking trail with dogs while it's over 100°
In 2016, Phoenix City Council made it a CRIME to tether an animal on less than 10 ft, in harsh weather conditions or with a collar that is too tight
In 2017, Arizona HB2494 was signed into law allowing Good Samaritans to take action without risk of civil liability for rescuing a child or pet from a locked hot car

KEEPING LIVESTOCK CALM DURING THE HOLIDAYS



Last summer, folks throughout Sunburst Farms shared a variety of techniques they use to keep their horses, goats, donkeys, canines, and other livestock calm and safe during holidays. *Note these have been lightly edited for clarity and space.*

GENERAL TIPS & TRICKS

- Ear plugs for horses. Pomms are good ones.
- For those with a well-maintained feeding schedule, consider feeding later to give the animals something else to focus on.
- Consider using essential oils, such as peace and calming, stress away, and lavender.
- Medications, including dormosedan, before the animal is too active/upset (be sure to check with your vet on what, if any, medication to use and how to administer it).
- Leave the barn open to allow animals to enter/exit as they need to. This allows them to go into the barn if they are scared as well as to exit in order to minimize the risk of them hurting themselves if contained in a stall.
- Allow all the animals to be in the same pasture together, with some extra treats to distract them.
- For smaller animals, consider crate training them. Many dogs feel safe in their crates

and are able to calm down once inside.

- For horses, keep them in a confined area so they don't blindly bolt around and possibly impale themselves on a fence or gate.
- Reward the animals for being calm during loud events.

DESENSITIZATION

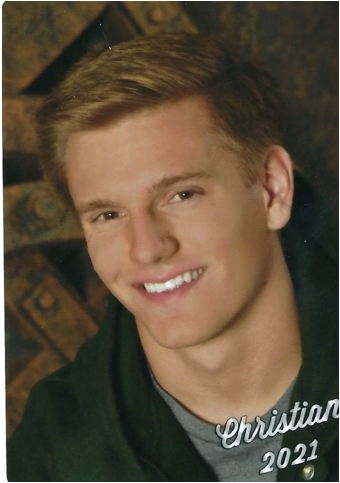
- Expose animals to loud sounds throughout the year, including tractors, cars, or music.
- Play a recording of fireworks leading up to the holiday, increasing the volume a little each time.
- Allow them to roam the property when you are mowing, edging, or doing other loud yard work.
- Invite kids over (in addition to giving the animals some extra love, kids are often loud and can help acclimate your animals to loud sounds and other people).
- Play loud music while outside with your animals, reward them for remaining calm.
- Ride quads, golf carts, or other ATVs near the animal(s).
- Intentionally set off fireworks at other times throughout the year near the animal(s); reward them for remaining calm.
- Make sure to give them plenty of space to react during the desensitization process. And remember, it's a process... start with small steps!

The above suggestions are only that: suggestions. Please be sure to confer with your veterinarian on what makes the most sense for your animals.

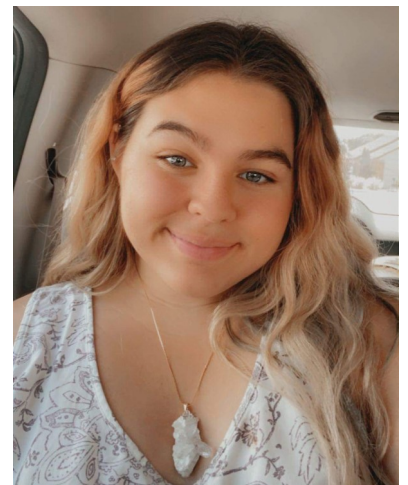
CHRISTIAN JOHNSON | 2021 SFCC GRADUATING SENIOR
